







Our Guest Conductors

Richard Laina

Since winning the sinfonia ViVA Conducting Scholarship in 2001, Richard has established a reputation as one of the most exciting and versatile young conductors in Britain. He is Music Director of the critically-acclaimed Birmingham-based professional opera company Operamus, Music Director of the Worcestershire Symphony Orchestra, the Leamington Chamber Orchestra, the Leicester Bach Choir, and the Midlands Chorale, and a regular guest conductor with Queen's Park Sinfonia, Midlands Sinfonia, Hallam Sinfonia and Chandos Symphony Orchestra. Richard is in demand as a coach at festivals and summer schools and as a leader of orchestral and choral workshops around the UK. He has premiered many new works and plays the violin for the Royal Shakespeare Company and the Orchestra of the Swan.



Anthony Bradbury



Anthony Bradbury was born in Worcestershire and attended King Edward VI College, Stourbridge, where he played clarinet, piano and percussion with numerous orchestras and ensembles. He continued his education at Brasenose College, Oxford University, studying Orchestration and Electro-Acoustic music with the composer Robert Sherlaw Johnson, and graduated with an MA in Music. Anthony is now a freelance conductor who works with a number of Midlands-based organisations. He is Principal Conductor of the Central England Ensemble (CEE), an orchestra whose remit is to support the work of contemporary composers from the Midlands, and he is a guest conductor of

the Sinfonia of Birmingham. Although this is Anthony's first concert series engagement with the BPO, he has directed the orchestra in two previous concerts with BFCS, the second being a performance of Dvorak's Requiem - a work premiered by BFCS in 1891 in Birmingham Town Hall - to commemorate the centenary of the composer's death.

Jonathan Tilbrook

Jonathan Tilbrook is an exciting and versatile conductor whose career has included performances at major venues throughout the UK as well as in East and West Europe, Scandinavia, New Zealand and the Far East. Recent seasons have brought his debut at Symphony Hall, Birmingham (with the Birmingham Philharmonic), a highly successful Barbican Hall début with the English Chamber Orchestra (which was followed by a further invitation to conduct the orchestra at the Bromsgrove Festival); Walton's Façade at the Albert Hall, Nottingham with Lady Susanna Walton and musicians from Sinfonia Viva, and appearances with the contemporary music ensemble 'One Voice' in Edinburgh. Jonathan presently



holds the position of Head of Postgraduate Studies at Trinity College of Music and the Sir Charles Mackerras Conducting Fellowship at Nottingham University where he has conducted a wide range of nineteenth and twentieth century repertoire.

Welcome

to our New Season 07-08

Welcome to the 2007-08 season of concerts by the Birmingham Philharmonic Orchestra, the jewel in the crown of non-professional music-making in the Midlands. Once again, we have a feast of the finest music from the large orchestral repertoire from the nineteenth-century to the present day, and a sparkling array of conductors and soloists joining us to perform it.

Music Director Michael Lloyd conducts two programmes, in February and April - the latter our celebration of Mahler in Town Hall Birmingham and Tewkesbury Abbey. We also welcome back Jonathan Tilbrook to conduct a programme of Slavonic music in June, and Anthony Bradbury to conduct our Christmas programme. Making his concert debut with the BPO in October is Richard Laing. Joining us as concerto soloists are young Belgian violinist Leonard Schreiber, making his third appearance with the BPO, and hornist Alison Bach, winner of the Ludlow Philharmonic Prize at the Birmingham Conservatoire. Finally, the BPO Concert Band makes a return by popular demand in January, with a programme of popular items from the wind band repertoire.

Birmingham Philharmonic Orchestra


The BPO, founded in the 1940's, is one of the country's leading non-professional symphony orchestras, with members from all walks of life throughout the Heart of England. It enjoys close links with both the Birmingham Conservatoire and the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra.

Michael Lloyd

Music Director and Conductor

Michael Lloyd first conducted the Birmingham Philharmonic Orchestra in 1985, and became Music Director and Principal Conductor in 1994.



Born in Worcestershire, he studied at the Birmingham School of Music, the University of East Anglia and the

Royal College of Music, concentrating on piano accompaniment. In 1972 he joined Scottish Ballet as company pianist and it was with this company that he made his professional conducting debut. Michael moved to Stuttgart to continue his operatic conducting, also working regularly as Associate Chorus Master for the Stuttgart Philharmonic Vocal Ensemble, South German Madrigal Choir and South German Radio Chorus.

From 1985 to 2003 he was a member of the music staff at English National Opera, becoming Assistant Music Director and later Senior Resident Conductor. He conducted regularly for the Company, both new productions and revivals in a wide variety of repertoire.

In addition to teaching regularly at the Opera Schools of the Royal College of Music and the Guildhall School of Music, he has conducted at all the major venues in London, Symphony Hall, Birmingham, and also in Japan and Korea. Since 1994 he has been a regular visitor to New Zealand, where he has conducted opera, ballet and concerts.

In 2006 he was appointed advisor to the Opera Genesis project at the Royal Opera House. From November 2006 he has been conducting most of the performances of the new production of The Sound of Music at the London Palladium. Plans for 2007 include return visits to Norway and New Zealand and performances of Nutcracker with Australian Ballet at the end of the year.

Our Soloists

Leonard Schreiber (Violin)

Leonard Schreiber was born in 1984 in Antwerp, Belgium. He began his violin studies at the age of six and made his concerto debut with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra of Flanders a year later. In 1995 he won the Herman Krebbers International Violin Competition in Maastricht, Netherlands, which gave him the opportunity to perform more concertos with orchestra. He participates in various masterclasses with teachers such as Dr. Felix Andrievsky, Herman Krebbers and Boris Kuschnir, and soloists Shlomo Mintz and Maxim Vengerov.



Alison Bach (Horn)



Alison Bach graduated with First Class Honours from Birmingham Conservatoire in 2007. While at the Conservatoire, Alison won the Ludlow Philharmonic Concerto Prize, the Musician's Union and Bill Warman Award for the Most Promising Instrumentalist, the Rollason Music Award and the Birmingham Conservatoire Brass Prize. As a soloist, Alison gave her concerto debut in 2007 with the Birmingham Conservatoire Symphony Orchestra performing the Knussen Horn Concerto. Future engagements include Strauss Horn Concerto No.1 with the Worthing Philharmonic

Orchestra and Britten Serenade for Tenor, Horn and Strings with the Queen's Park Sinfonia.

Amanda Winfield (Soprano)

Amanda Winfield was raised and trained in New Zealand, making her professional debut in 1998 singing Emilia and covering the role of Desdemona in Otello for New Zealand National Opera. In 1999 Amanda moved to New York and whilst in the USA appeared in over 20 productions with Manhattan's Dicapo Opera Theatre. Among the notable directors and conductors Amanda has worked with are Michael Lloyd (ENO), Karen Keltner (San Diego Opera), John Hoomes (Nashville Opera), Anton Coppola and Louis Salemno.



Emma Selway (Mezzo-soprano)



Emma Selway studied at the Royal Academy of Music from 1989 to 1992 and the National Opera Studio. She won a number of prizes at the RAM including the Opera Prize, the Isabella Lucas Prize and the Tom Hammond Prize. Amici di Verdi supported her study at the NOS. She was a finalist in the 1991 Kathleen Ferrier Memorial Competition. She now studies with Mollie Petrie. Emma Selway made her operatic debut at English National Opera as Kate Pinkerton in Madama

Butterfly, and future performances include her Royal Opera debut as Hippolyta in A Midsummer Night's Dream in 2008.
